Andy Goes to Texas

I had the opportunity to visit the Big Buck Brewery and Steakhouse in Grapevine, Texas, near Dallas. The restaurant and brewery are attached to the Bass Pro store, for a great shopping / eating / drinking experience. Go through the Bass Pro store first, to avoid buying out the store. The whole facility is done in a log cabin style, on steroids. With a 70 foot arched ceiling over a massive dining area, plus a tavern on a balcony, the place is Texas huge.

Cheryl and I shared a beer sampler, and all of the beers were great. They have a diet/light beer that was actually pretty tasty. On tap were Red Stag Ale, Antler Ale, Buck Naked (light beer), Big Buck Scotch Ale, Black River Stout (my favorite), Hefe-Weizen, and an IPA. Check the website for current beers on tap. The food was also really great, making it a pretty good outing.

I met up briefly with Cleon Converse, the General Manager, and he explained a little about their operations, including another brew-pub / restaurant in Gaylord, Michigan. (That explained the photographs of snow-covered landscapes in a Texas establishment)

The brewery was closed for the evening, but is visible through the huge class windows. It was interesting that the finishing tanks are labeled "Tax Determination Tanks", as this determines how much of the beer is taxable. This is a full service facility, and I would recommend stopping in if you are in the area.

Bud Light to Optimator: A Beer Drinker's Odyssey

A friend of mine (let's call him Steve) and I were talking about beers and brewing. He admitted that he was a faithful Bud Light drinker for years. He said he probably wouldn't appreciate homebrew because he had never been exposed to better beer. I saw this as an opportunity and ran with it.

We went to Landmark 1850 one day after work and introduced him to beer with flavor. We started out with a German Lager, Beck's. Steve and I talked about what the beer smelled like, what it looked like, and finally what it tasted like. (Fortunately, he liked this beer right off the bat.) We tried Sprecher Amber next and contrasted that beer with Beck's. I was impressed we were two for two. Next, we tried St. Pauli Girl Dark so that he could see a dark beer is not thick and chewy but flavorful and delicious. Steve was quite impressed that German Darks are just as good as the Lagers.

Our next choice was Guinness and compared that beer to the previous beer. Immediately, he did not like the Guinness so I was forced to finish it for him. (It was a tough job!) We talked about the flavors he tasted and why he didn't like it. From there we went Leinekugel's Creamy Dark which he loved. He enjoyed that beer the most out of all the beers we sampled so far. At this point, I wanted to see whether he might like hops so I ordered a Sierra Nevada Pale Ale.

Steve is not a hop head. He clearly did not care for the beer. We switched gears at this point and ordered some fruit beers to see whether he would like those. We had a Lindeman Framboise and contrasted that with the New Glarus Raspberry Tart. He liked both beers but preferred the Raspberry Tart. Again, we smelled both beers, looked at them and tasted them side by side. Steve mentioned fruit beers are not a favorite but he has an appreciation for them now.

Happy Hour was drawing to a close and we needed to make another selection. I always say when in doubt, go German. I ordered Spaten Optimator for Steve. He took a taste, looked at me and said, "This is the best beer I've ever tasted." I was quite surprised and thought it might be the beer channeling Steve's voice but he finished the beer and ordered another of the same. I know he must like the beer as he seems to always have it in his refrigerator in his basement. His basement is covered in Budweiser mirrors, neon signs, Bud ceramic mugs, Clydesdales, etc.... Also, he has Creamy Dark available when I've stopped by. The lesson I've learned from this is not to be discouraged when friends say they wouldn't appreciate your homebrew. Steve's palate had never experienced good beer so he didn't feel qualified to decide what beer with flavor tastes like. Now, I give him my beer and he can describe flavors and tell why he does or doesn't like it. This might have never happened had we not made a trip to Landmark for some beer education. If only you could get college credits for this....

At the end of the tour there is beer in sight, however only three varieties are available in small quantities (3—3oz pours for \$3.50).

Don't get me wrong the New Glarus brewery produces good beer and it is pretty fascinating to see all the fancy equipment inside the brewery, but it seems to be lacking as far as tours and sampling. There is great information available if you have the patience to walk around and hit all the spots one by one, but it will take you awhile.

Either way I didn't mind stopping at the brewery. I picked up some beer and my brother and his wife had an opportunity to have some samples.
